EDITORIAL

Dr. Timothy Leary once referred to J.R.R. Tolkien's trilogy as the "best books ever written". The zenith of Frodo's popularity was perhaps reached in 1968. On university campuses in Canada and the United States, students have established their own genre of cult for the worship of Hobbit Power.

To the uninitiated, it may seem as impossible to relate to Middle Earth with its hairy-footed hobbits, orcs, wizards, and barrow-wights, as it would be to become emotionally involved in the Grimm Brothers' Fairy Tales.

Yet involvement is exactly what Tolkien intended for us. He believed that the adult, crushed by the complexity of textbooks and literary works, longed to return to the simplicity of make-believe. Tolkien wrote *Lord of the Rings* to offer a means of escape into new worlds of fantasy, without the need to regress to the stories of our childhood. The popularity his books have enjoyed attests to the validity of Tolkien's hypothesis.

We dedicate Prelude 1969 to Lord of the Rings, and indirectly, to Imagination and the fairy tale world it creates. Literary critics have concerned themselves with the examination of Tolkien's philosophies, but above all the Trilogy stands as a monument to the fantasy the human mind devises, whether it is the world of science fiction or the forests of Middle Earth.

You are now about to begin Prelude 1969. If the symbols or some of the drawings confuse you, I can only urge you to read the books. They alone can provide the key.


Determined, Man struggled fiercely to his feet, wavered, took a few long, drunken strides, and fell first to his battered
