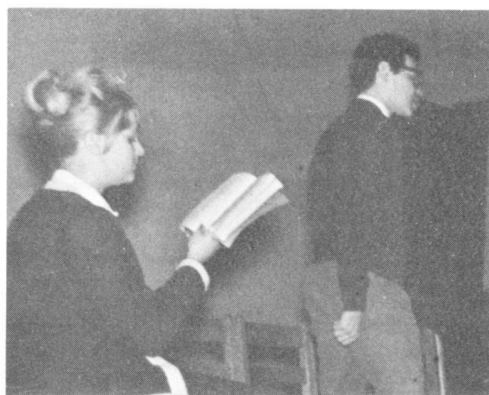

It is hoped that the future will bring with it as successful ventures into the exciting field of journalism as the 1966 Wagar Watch did.



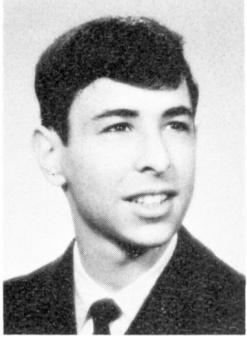

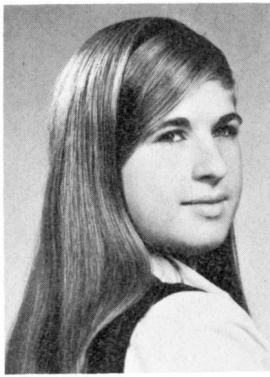
possible, a "Lost and Found" counter was set up and run by the prefects. They also took care of the late desk and the absentee lists.

It would like to express its best wishes to the graduates. Best wishes go always to next year's Red Cross Council and executive.



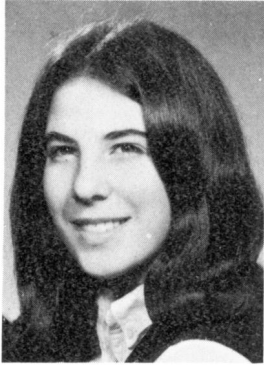

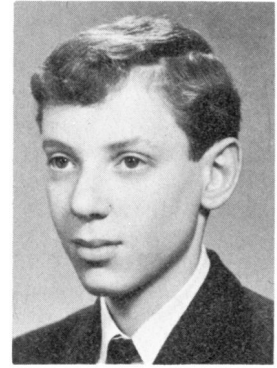

The C.B.C. Youth Council serves as an effective link between Canada's great communications network and the youth of today.

At its bi-monthly meetings, much time is spent discussing and criticizing such C.B.C. television shows as "Reach for the Top", "The New Generation" "Teen '66" and many more. At each meeting there is a distinguished guest speaker who discusses some interesting aspect of communications.

Each year the Council plans a major project to raise money for scholarships to be awarded to those councillors who have prepared and delivered the best oral theses. This year, a large and most successful dance was held.

## EATON'S JUNIOR COUNCIL

In the year 1946, the Eaton's Junior Council was created. Each school would send a boy and girl from grade eleven to represent it at the Council's meetings. This year there are 57 girls, who are called Junior Councillors, and 57 boys, who are called Junior Executives.

Its main objective is to bring about a better understanding of the business and professional world through a carefully planned program of speakers and tours. Furthermore it tries to weld the gap between religion, culture, and language of different creeds. By working together as a team each individual develops poise, personality, a sense of responsibility, and a degree of maturity.

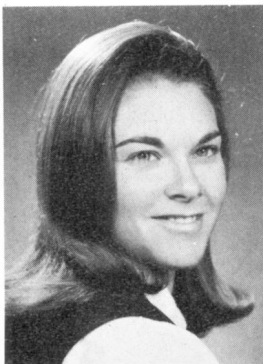
Students are chosen during their tenth grade to represent their school in their final year. They must be a popular choice among their fellow students. These names are then submitted to the Principal for

consideration. He selects three candidates who are interviewed by the council advisors. The Junior Councillor, or Executive, must also possess such qualities as a high academic standing, a well-rounded personality, participation in extra curricular activities, and general leadership.

Each member is given a navy blue blazer with identifying pin and crest. The boys wear a Junior Executive tie as well. These articles are kept by each, and the cost for them is nil.

The meetings start at 9:00 a.m. every Saturday morning, and last until noon, when the councillors are paid. A Saturday is spent in listening to a speaker, or on a tour, or by planning parties. The afternoon is free to allow the councillors to do as they like. Most of the parties and tours are paid by Eaton's.

To add to the interest there are various contests among the councillors, such as a speaking contest,

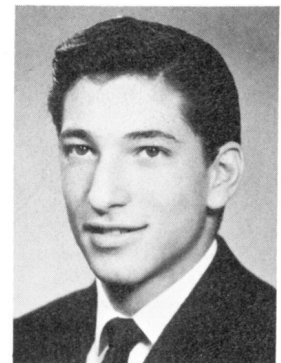

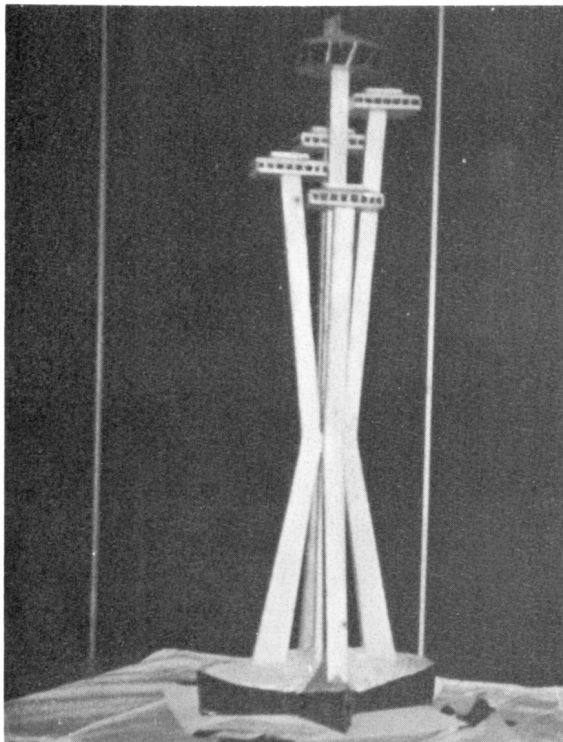

# CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS

Extra-curricular activities are of tremendous importance to the students, as they provide a relief from his school work. Architectural and Engineering Club—the members acquire added knowledge about this field and, using it, create a project.

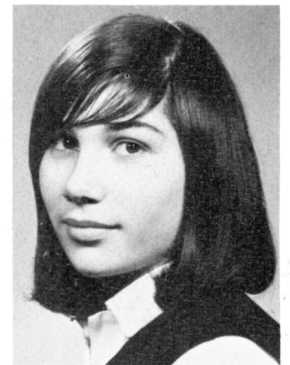
The Camera Club—Its purpose is to study photography by taking pictures.
