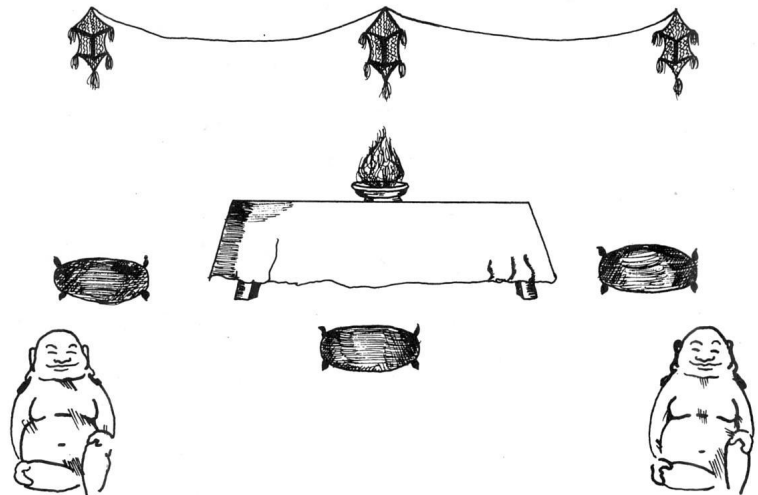

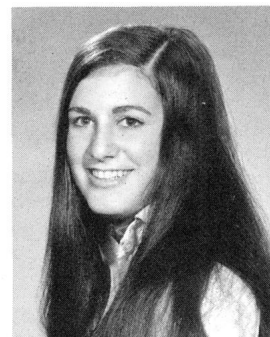
MISS FAMOUS PLAYERS

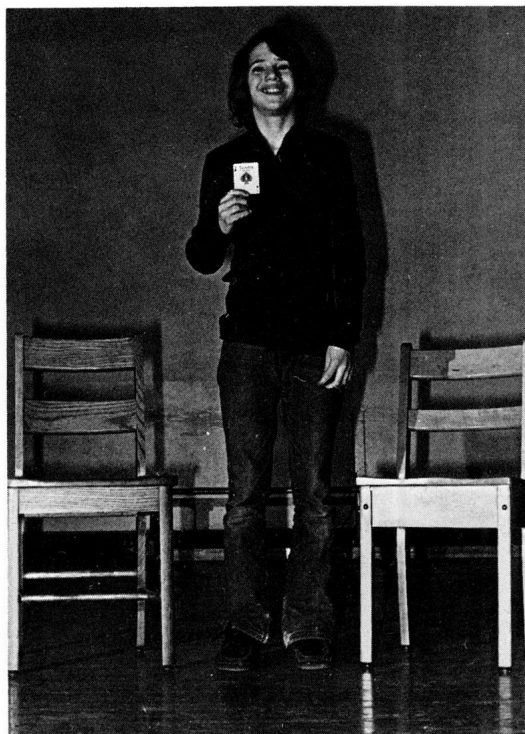

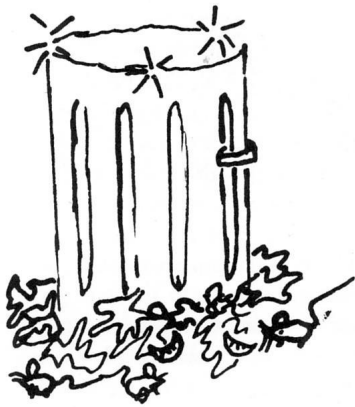

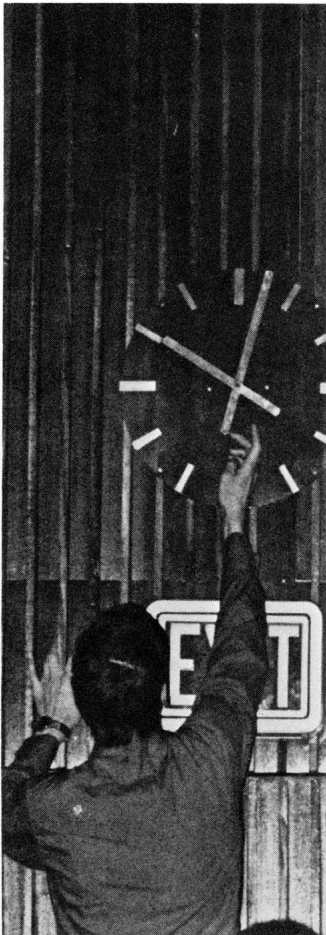
