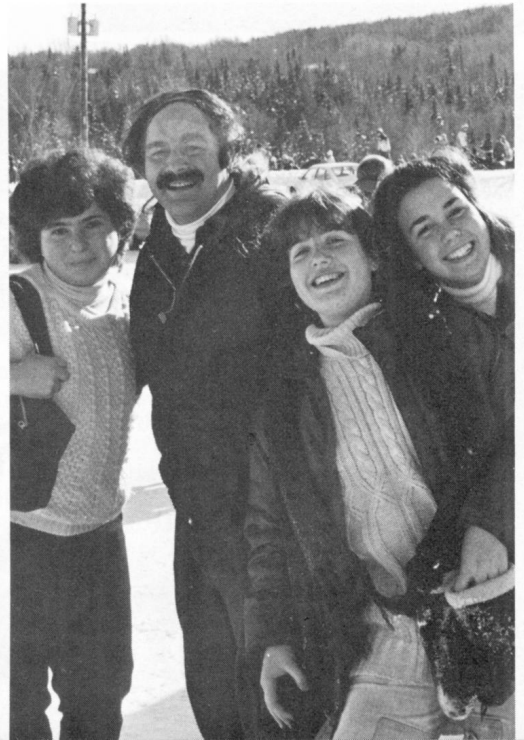
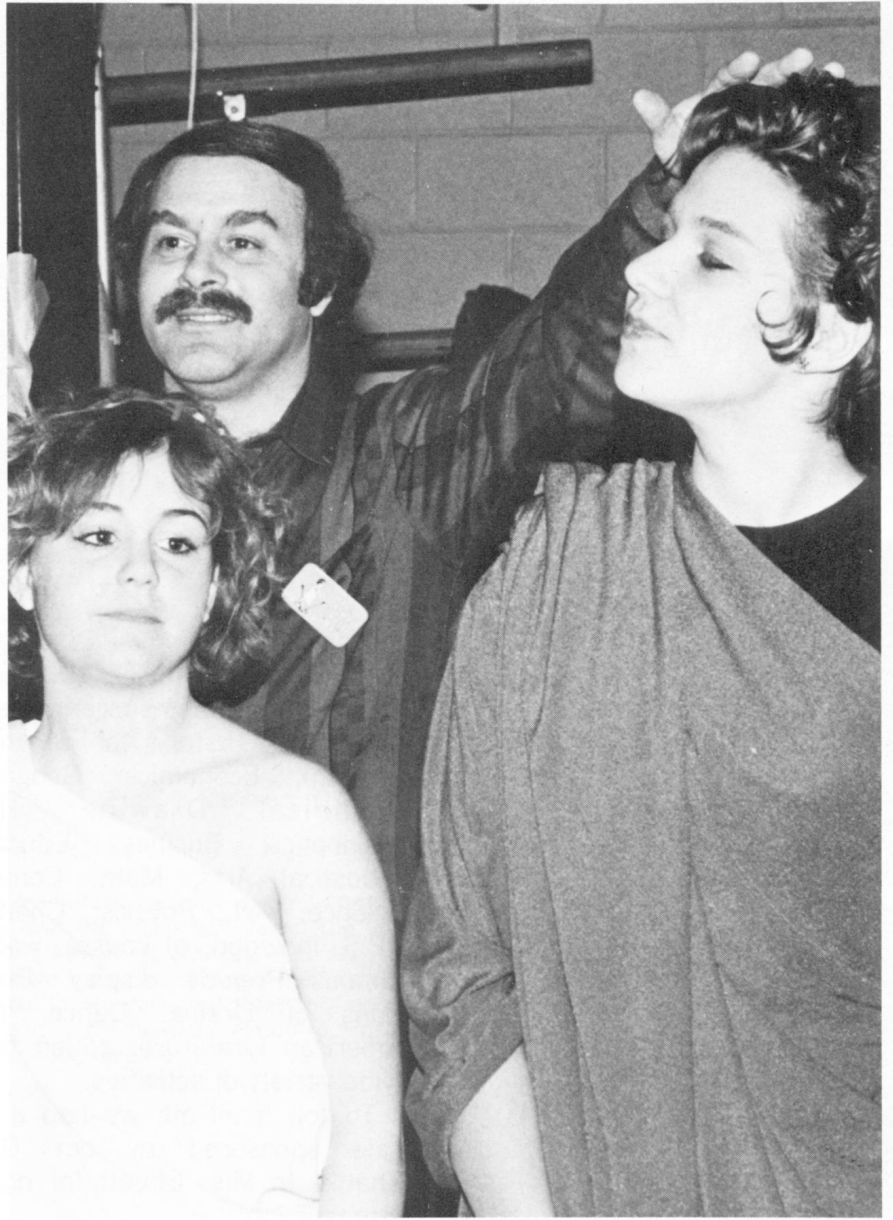
OPEN HOUSE

All in all, everyone had a superb time!

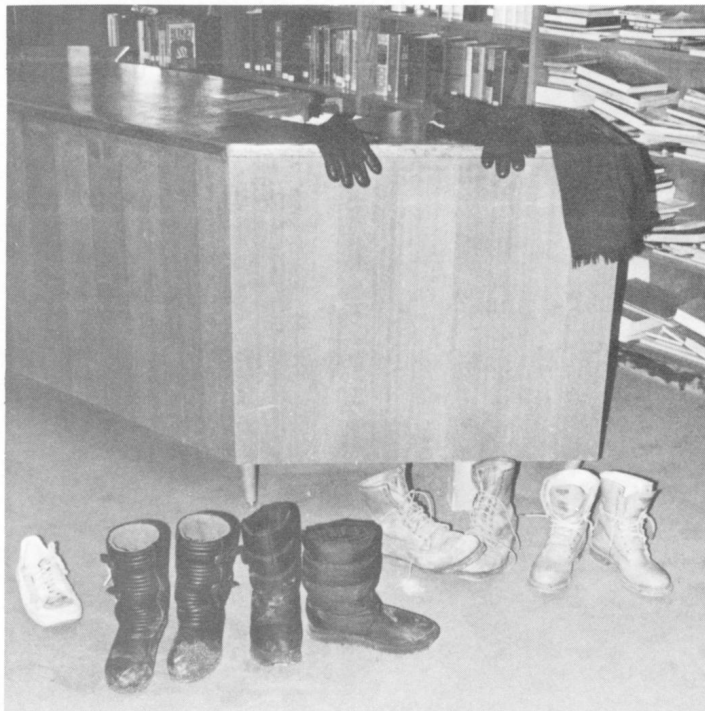




The Fish Club

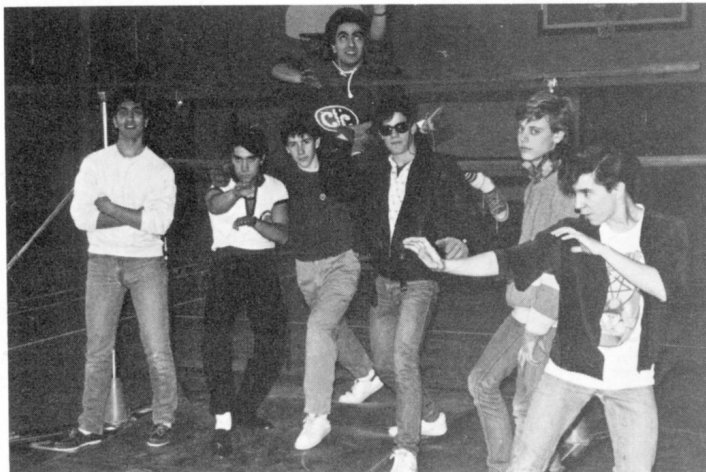
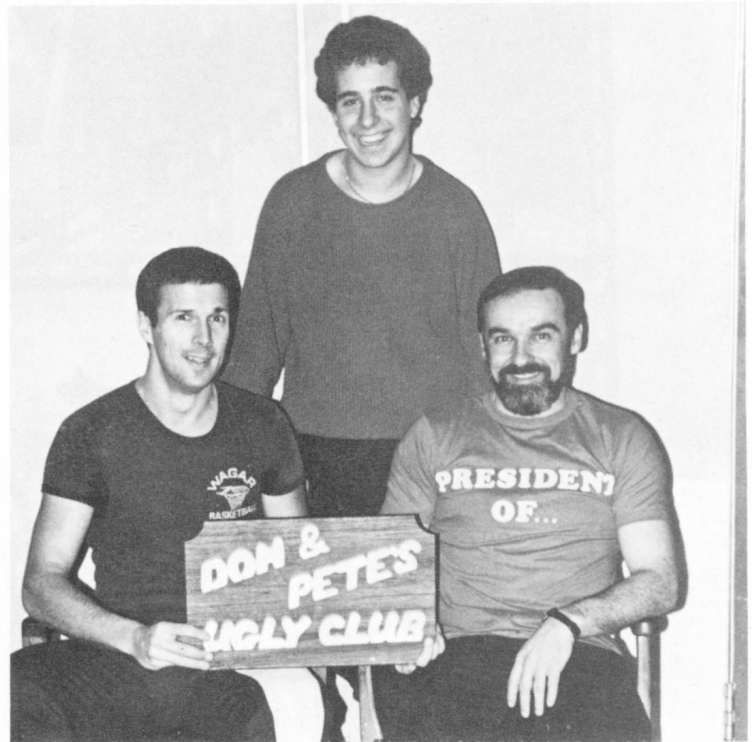
THE UGLY CLUB

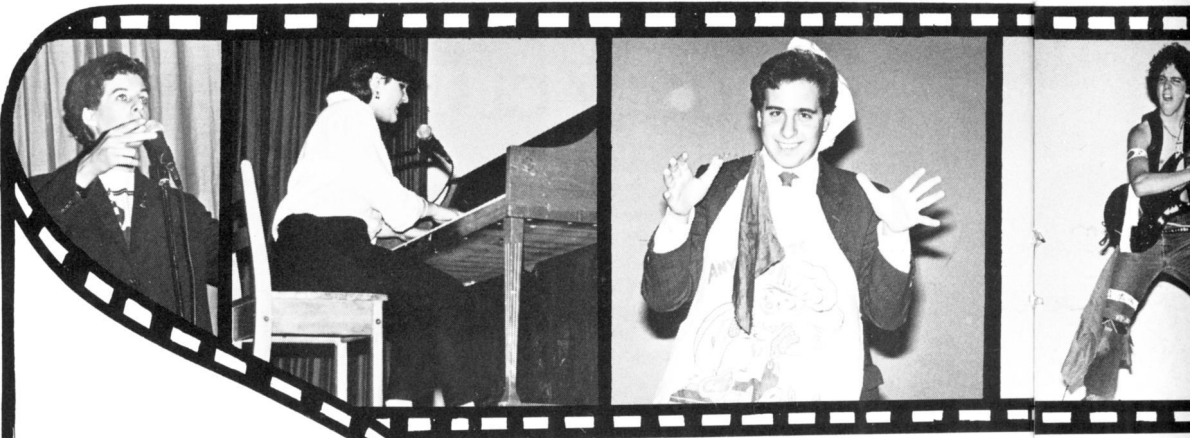
